One of my other loves is Toastmasters to which I have belonged since 1959 and I rarely miss a meeting. I remember one of our presidents wondering how we could attract more members into a non profit organization with a limited budget.

What About the Library?



They have no postal standing in that they do not meet standards and regulations set forth by the Universal Postal Union because their publishers usually do not provide any postal services and have no postal sovereignty.

Fake stamps are often introduced by governments in exile, resistance movements or separatist organizations which have no postal sovereignty but use the stamps for political propaganda.

There are those who just want to make an extra buck. Then there are those who just simply want to have some good ol' philatelic fun. Also, there is, or was, Mr. Martin Harman of Lundy Island who thought he was the "King of Puffin Land!"

This yarn comes into being in 1925 when a wealthy Englishman, Martin Harman, became the owner of the minuscule 3-mile long Island of Lundy near the coast of Devon County and Barnstaple Bay.
