

## Captain Tim Started Young Collectors In The Stamp Hobby

"Captain Tim" was a radio program in the 1930s sponsored by Ivory Soap which was made by Proctor and Gamble. If young kids like me sent in the correct number of box tops from "Ivory Snow" boxes they would receive a small 128-page album, including an index of countries, a packet of stamps to start them out, and some stamp hinges.

The album, stamps and hinges were provided by H. E. Harris Co. located in Boston, MA, at the time. Along with hints about stamp collecting, Captain Tim used radio time to encourage youngsters to study their stamps carefully as he did, to never give up and "to keep healthy."

Captain Tim was in the British Intelligence Service or Secret Service during WW I. One of his main assignments was to catch enemy spies. While in London in 1916 the Censorship Department told Captain Tim they were watching very carefully those letters a particular man was sending to Holland. This man was a stamp collector and he was exchanging stamps with another collector in Amsterdam. His mail

was being very thoroughly watched because the letters were addressed to a location in Amsterdam where spies sometimes received their mail.

Being a stamp collector himself, Captain Tim was naturally interested and he asked to see the stamps the man was sending. For weeks Tim studied those stamps and letters but he could find nothing extraordinary or suspicious about them. One day Captain Tim got the idea that maybe the stamps themselves were codes! And sure enough, every stamp had a hidden meaning.

The stamps the spy had sent to Holland divulged secret information about the British Navy and Army. When he sent a 2-shilling stamp to his friend in Amsterdam it meant a battleship had just left England. A one-shilling stamp meant a cruiser. A 5-penny stamp signified a destroyer and so on. When Captain Tim figured out the code, he caught his man!

Along with pages for mounting some 4,000 stamps, the little album contained chapters entitled Adventuring With Postage Stamps, How to Start a Stamp Collection, How to Organize a Stamp Club, and a Gallery of Famous Collectors such as Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Herbert Hoover and King George V.

## The American Philatelic Society - What's In It For You?

Your editor, Larry Benson, asked me to write about the American Philatelic Society and what keeps me in the APS year after year and why YOU should join, too.

It is a good question, and one whose answer I hadn't vocalized in quite awhile. There are obvious answers that are touted in the membership brochures, but these give only an overview of what is available. The reason why I have been a member for 20 continuous years is because membership not only saves me money, but it makes me money, too. Being a naturally thrifty person, this is overwhelmingly compelling.

#### How Can APS Save Money?

So how does this work? How can membership save you money? How can it make you money?

Have you bought a philatelic book lately? A specialized catalog or a handbook on a specific aspect of postal history can easily cost \$50 or more to buy, but my APS membership gives me carte blanche to the very impressive collection of books, catalogs and periodicals housed in the American Philatelic Research Library (APRL.)

All I need do is call, write or e-mail one of the helpful members of the APRL staff telling them what books I want to borrow. A few days later they are delivered to my door. I pay a small borrowing fee and postage. It costs me about \$5 or \$6 to borrow a book that would have cost me \$50 to buy. In one single transaction I have saved enough money to pay for my dues and a nice cover or two!



And, that's just the tip of the iceberg. Not only have I bought interesting stamps for my collection at favorable prices through services of the APS Sales Division, but I have also **sold** surplus material. It's easy and fun making up the booklets of stamps to consign items to be sold. About a year later you receive a check for the material that sold and return of whatever did not sell. So, you see, you **make** money!

#### Magazine Makes Me Money

A more subtle way the APS makes money for me is due to the colorful monthly magazine American Philatelist. Suppose there is an article about an obscure pen cancel on a particular stamp that is often mistaken for a much less desirable revenue cancel. A few months later I see that very stamp priced as a revenue at a stamp show. The knowledge gained from reading that article allows me to spot a bargain I may have otherwise bypassed.

These are all good sound financial reasons to be an APS member, but there is one even more compelling reason to belong that has nothing to do with money. Being an APS member has brought me into contact with people I never would have had the opportunity to meet (such as my ol' buddy Larry Benson.) Seeing old friends and making new ones at the annual APS conventions called STAMPSHOW (held in August) or the new Winter Show (in February) is a benefit for which no price can be placed.

I hope to see **you** in February when the APS brings its Winter Show "AMERICAS 99" to Orlando, Florida, February 25-28. Meanwhile, Happy collecting!


