Station 3 - Basics of Collecting: Soaking, Hinging, etc. Bob Hargrave


Station 4 - Cataloging & Identifying John Goble



Is The Use of Stamps Diminishing?

Several collectors have mentioned that the use of postage stamps seems to be diminishing. One such collector even checked his wastebaskets to determine the percentage of metered stamps to postage stamps and reported his findings in Linn's Stamp News.

Of course, there are many meter collectors in the hobby, but have you noticed the television commercial by the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) promoting a meter canceler for your home? The question is: "will stamps become more valuable when they disappear from the market?"

Not long ago, I visited a small business that depends on sales from their mailings and I noticed the clerk using Flag Over Porch definitives on her next mailing. I suggested a

commemorative stamp would command a lot more attention by setting it apart from the junk mail. She took the hint, and her next mailing was franked with the 29 cent flower issue of 1992.

The suggestion impressed the company so much, they subscribed to the USPS USA Philatelic catalog and they order stamps direct from the Fulfillment Center by telephone.

Sometimes their customers move and mail is returned. Guess who gets their used stamps?

There is a lot we can do to promote our hobby. Do you use commemoratives on all your mail? If you want your correspondence to be saved from the "garbage mail" filling our mailboxes these days, use a commemorative stamp!

Buy Stamps by Mail

Buying stamps by mail saves not only a trip to the post office and time, but gives you great choices and ordering is easy. Or, at least, that's what the USPS claims.

You can pick up the Stamps By Mail folder containing information and the order form at your nearest post office. In addition to the order form, a return post paid addressed envelope for returning your payment is enclosed. All orders from here are processed in Jacksonville.
