

Zachary Taylor Refused to Pay for Letters Sent Collect

In 1848, General Zachary Taylor, who was later elected president, told the Baton Rouge, LA postmaster that he would no longer pay for letters sent collect. In early June of that year, the Whig Party nominated him as their presidential candidate. The party chairman notified Taylor of his nomination by mail. When he hadn't replied by late June, the party chairman wrote to Taylor again. The first letter, it seems, was sitting in the Baton Rouge post office, postage due. Taylor waited until his was going that way, paid the postage, read the letter and accepted the nomination.

A Male Senior Citizen's Guide to Prostate Cancer ... By Don Plaskett

Your general practitioner (GP) has been watching your PSA (prostate specific antigen) slowly rise over the past few years. Finally, my GP made an appointment with a urologist for me when my PSA hit 8.3 in my 75th year. The urologist gave me three choices all of which were viable but dependent upon my overall health. The choices were:

- 1. Do nothing. The cancer grows at a very slow rate. Perhaps you have lived all the years you want and another five or 10 will do;
- 2. Remove the prostate. It has been good to you but it will be remembered in a long recovery period.
- 3. Go for a low radiation seed implant. That seemed to be the best choice for me considering my age and health. The decision to go with number three was made and a date set for the implanting.

You and your insurance provider and Medicare will be pleased to know you have hired a GP, a urologist, an oncologist and an anesthetist. They all want to keep an eye on you but the urologist is "King."

An attorney also with a high PSA would be helpful at your first visit to the hospital. You will be asked to sign numerous forms protecting them from EVERYTHING, including mistakes and falling aircraft wheels. You had to decide whether to have a spinal or full anesthetic and because I wanted my moneys worth, I picked the latter.

Your big day begins early in the morning but the nurses give you a little extra time to figure out how to stop those drafts common to hospital gowns. Someone is bound to find an extra test that will delay your trip to the table.

I enjoyed the scenic trip given by another senior with driving experience as he wheeled me into the domain of the anesthetist. Beware of the person who will give you something to relax you. When he does, his will be the last voice you will hear until you wake up later.

Your urologist has found a target area "below" called the perineum. In that little area he is able to find space for as many as 50 needles loaded with a low radiation "seed" (I-125 radioactive iodine.) With his skill he is able to implant some 150 of these seeds. You are now radioactive and will be well warned to avoid grandchildren and pregnant women. You also will have first call on the softest cushions in the house as it will be a delicate exercise to sit down for at least the next five days.

Enjoy "GA-GA" land for a few hours during which you will be laced with tubes including a catheter. It would be nice if you could bank a little urine because you won't get out of the hospital until you have met your quota. When the catheter is removed, you will have an unlimited supply for forest fires or other conflagrations.

You may not have to stay in the hospital over night, but I did. Sleep comes in 15 minute increments as a small army of people performs tests and always right on schedule. If you embarrass easily, pretend you are sleeping but if it doesn't matter, enjoy yourself because it might not happen again.

You will leave the hospital in a wheelchair whether you want to run out or not. Finally, all the trauma and mystery are "behind" you. With some rest you will be as good as new in four to five days.

Your only worry will be the cost of the recovery medication...your last great shock!

So, why have I written this light-hearted report on a serious problem that plagues males? Without any hint of danger, I am thankful my GP was alerted to my condition and did something about it. When I talk about the procedure, so many men will change the subject because it's still a "no-no." I am confident that a brief discomfort may have extended my life span.

I want to join Arny's Army and along with Arnold Palmer, Jim Colbert, Bob Dole and others who found out that a simple blood test and examination at least once a year for men over 50 is important. Be aware, and don't ignore regular checkups.

Of all the friends I have, Bruce was among the least pretentious. He never "put on airs" but was down-to-earth, always displaying a winning smile, chatted easily with anyone who would start a conversation and he never met a stranger.

Bruce was most proud of his wife, Pat, and their four children. Next, though, was his achieving citizenship by virtue of his service in the U.S. Navy during WWII. He received the Purple Heart, a fact I didn't know until I read about it in the local newspaper.

Most of our members knew Bruce was a native of Belize. He would talk about that country at the "drop of a hat" and he presented several interesting programs about the stamps of Belize at club meetings throughout the years.

He served in several capacities with the Tallahassee Stamp and Cover Club, including Librarian and Treasurer. He and Pat attended the very first organizational meeting of the club which was held in March 1988 in the community room at Tallahassee Community Hospital.

His attendance at meetings was regular and he and Pat only missed when they were out of town or ill. His quiet confidence, devotion to the stamp collecting hobby, readiness to help with projects, twinkling eyes, warmth, charm and ready smile will surely be missed.


